Two recent college graduates move to New York to edit a new magazine called *The National Lampoon*. Over the next decade, Henry Beard and Doug Kenney, along with a loose amalgamation of fellow satirists including Michael O ’ Donoghue and P. J. O ’ Rourke, popularized a smart, caustic, ironic brand of humor that has become the dominant voice of American comedy. The *Broadview Anthology of Victorian Poetry and Poetic Theory* is the most comprehensive collection of poetry from the period ever published.
