David Garland puts penal populism under the microscope, whilst Alison Liebling explores the empirical evidence for theories of penal legitimacy. Mike Nellis looks back at the use of the creative arts in prisons in Scotland's Barlinnie Unit, whilst Justice Tankebe explores police legitimacy.

She examines how extreme groups construct, collectivize, mobilize and legitimize--but also resist--ideas of masculinity and gender.
