Large fire apparatus manufacturers started to manufacture water tanker fire trucks in the late 1950s, but it

wasn't until the 1970s that custom-made water tankers became popular. Shown are tankers by all the major and minor fire apparatus manufacturers and regional builders, among conversions built by local shops.
