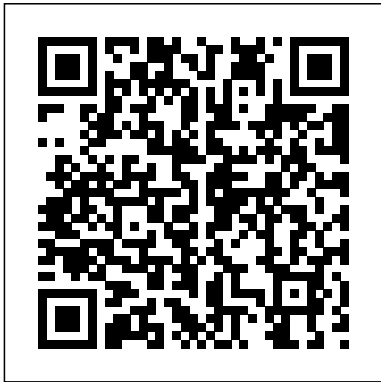

This report covers the activities that were performed to enhance the current Montana Department of Transportation (MDT) ride specification for flexible pavements. The project team reviewed the MDT ride specification for flexible

pavements and compared it with proposed improvements to the current literature and state of practice. An extensive state of practice survey of other Departments of Transportation (DOTs) was conducted and the results were utilized to provide recommendations to MDT for improving its ride specification. This report provides detailed information on the review of MDT current ride specification, literature review, state of the practice survey, and recommendations for improvements. The recommendations cover the current ride specification, tolerances, project classification levels, analysis tools and indices, and methods of acceptance. As part of the recommendations, a series of new documents [i.e. Profiler Operations Manual, Quality Control/Quality Assurance (QC/QA) Plan] have been developed to enhance future profile data collection and analysis. Based on the findings of this project, the project team have revised the document entitled: Method of Sampling and Testing (MT 422)

and the document: MDT Ride Specification For Flexible Pavement. An implementation plan has been developed and presented in this report to provide MDT with a road map for implementing the findings of this project.

The Bitterroot River trout fishery has experienced depravation from mankind since the early 1900’s when Marcus Daly “The Copper King” and others commissioned the building of an extensive network of

irrigation canals throughout the Bitterroot Valley. The largest canal is the Big Ditch, which runs northerly over seventy-five miles in length traversing the eastside of the Bitterroot River Valley. They built large diversion dams across the Bitterroot River and diverted most of the tributaries in the Bitterroot Valley. These diversion dams dewater the Bitterroot River severely during the summer months. Most of the Bitterroot Tributaries become dry during critical spawning periods for Rainbow Trout, Westslope Cutthroat Trout, Brown Trout and Bull Trout. With these depravation problems on the Bitterroot River there are still some sections of the Bitterroot River that offer good fishing for Rainbow Trout, Brown Trout and Westslope Cutthroat Trout and to a lesser degree Bull Trout. The Bitterroot River at time offers some excellent dry fly fishing. In March and April there are Stone Flies: Skwala Stone Flies (*Skwala parallela*) and Winter Stone Flies (*Capina* sp.), May Flies: Midges (Diptera / Chironomous), Early Blue-Winged Olive (*Baetis tricaudatus*), Dark
