Unfolding over the
witching hours between
midnight and 6am, this

experience of physical
isolation, and creates a

shared language for the experience of feeling alone. Through these three main characters—mother, son, adventuring explorer—Mutch triangulates overlapping and layered themes of solitude that enlighten and uplift one another.
