"One night when she was four and sleeping in the bottom bunk of her bunk bed, Ruth Cole woke to the sound of lovemaking—it was coming from her parents' bedroom." This sentence opens John Irving's ninth novel, *A Widow for One Year*, a story of a family marked by tragedy. Ruth Cole is a complex, often self-contradictory character—a "difficult" woman. By no means is she conventionally "nice," but she will never be forgotten. Ruth's story is told in three parts, each focusing on a critical time in her life. When we first meet her—on Long Island, in the summer of 1958—Ruth is only four. The second window into Ruth's life opens on the fall of 1990, when she is an unmarried woman whose personal life is not

nearly as successful as her literary career. She distrusts her judgment in men, for good reason. *A Widow for One Year* closes in the autumn of 1995, when Ruth Cole is a forty-one-year-old widow and mother. She's about to fall in love for the first time. Richly comic, as well as deeply disturbing, *A Widow for One Year* is a multilayered love story of astonishing emotional force. Both ribald and erotic, it is also a brilliant novel about the passage of time and the relentlessness of grief.

John Irving's memoir describes the author's involvement (and lack thereof) in

five of the films that have (and have not) been made from his nine novels. *My Movie Business* focuses primarily on the thirteen years Mr. Irving spent writing and rewriting his screenplay of *The Cider House Rules*, for four different directors. A Miramax production, the film was finally shot in the fall of 1998 directed by the Swedish director Lasse Hallström (*My Life as a Dog*), with Michael Caine in the role of Dr. Larch. *The Cider House Rules* is a November 1999 release. Mr. Irving also writes about the failed effort to make his first novel, *Setting Free the Bears*, into a movie; about two of the films that were made from his novels (but not from his screenplays), *The World According to Garp* and *The Hotel New Hampshire*; and about his ongoing struggle to shepherd his screenplay of *A Son of the Circus* into production. In addition to its qualities as a memoir - anecdotal, comic, affectionate, and candid - *My Movie Business* is an insightful essay on the essential differences between writing a novel and writing a screenplay. Never have the two forms of storytelling been so lucidly compared and contrasted; the details are memorable, the examples clarifying. *My Movie Business* includes photos by Stephen Vaughan, the still photographer on the film set of *The Cider House Rules*.
