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Cervical Cancer Screening Guidelines for Average-Risk Women

Screening includes cervical cytology (also called the Pap test or Pap smear) and, for some women, testing for human papillomavirus

(HPV). How does cervical cancer occur? Cancer occurs when cervical cells become abnormal and, over time, grow out of control. The cancer cells invade deeper into the cervical tissue.

The guidelines generally advise a reduction in the number of tests women get over their lifetime to better ensure that they receive the benefits of testing while minimizing the harms, and include a preference for co-testing using the Pap test and HPV test for women age ages 30 to 65.

The following tests may be done depending on your age and your initial Pap test result (see Table 1): Repeat Pap test or co-test—A repeat Pap test or a repeat co-test (Pap test and a test for high-risk types of HPV) is recommended as a follow-up to some abnormal test results.

Recommendation Don't perform Pap smears on women under the age of 21 or women who have had a hysterectomy for non-cancer disease. Most observed abnormalities in adolescents regress spontaneously ...

- Pap Smear Screening begins at age 21 regardless of when sexual activity starts. Adolescents/young women 20 and below are not recommended to have a Pap test or HPV testing. Pap

screening may end at age 65 if the Pap history is unremarkable and the patient is low risk. .

Abnormal Cervical Cancer Screening Test Results - ACOG Primary hrHPV testing is defined as a stand-alone test for cervical cancer screening without concomitant cytology testing. It may be followed by other tests (like a Pap) for triage. This test specifically identifies HPV 16 and HPV 18, while concurrently detecting 12 other types of high-risk HPVVs.
