to the diary of Reverend
Stephen Williams who attended
the sermon, "Before the
sermon was done there was a

great moaning and crying
through the whole House, 'what
shall I do to be saved; oh, I
am going to hell, etc.'" The
diary goes on to indicate that
Edwards had to interrupt his
sermon and come down to
minister to those who were
under such awful conviction.
And so, in spite of what the
scoffers might think or say,
"the amazing and astonishing
power of God" was manifested
among the people that day—with
many falling not into the
hands of an angry God, but
into the arms of a mighty
Savior.
