Second, adverb clauses contain subordinate conjunctions that prevent them from containing complete thoughts and becoming full sentences.; Third, all adverb clauses answer one of the classic “adverb questions:” When?

Answer: The answer adverb clause is not correct. Explanation: This is a very tricky example, and the

subordinating conjunction "where" could have fooled you. In fact, the clause does not answer the adverb question "where?", but the adjective question "which place?". This is an adjective clause, modifying the noun "place."

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
