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Introduction 19 A recurring concern, then, must be with the theoretical framework that is the basis for research, and how the research questions, methodology, analysis, and findings all fit into this framework. In this respect sociolinguistics is like all other sciences.

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Gender – exclusive linguistic forms used only by women, and others used only by men reflect gender – exclusive social roles. This is because in such communities the responsibilities of men and women differ. For example, in Bengali, a wife (who is subordinate to her husband) will not call him by his real name, but would instead use any other word to refer to him.

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Janet Holmes is Professor of Linguistics at the University of Victoria in Wellington (New Zealand). Sociolinguistics is the study of the relationships between language and society. The book is structured like a school manual for students on the topic, but targeted to laid readers.
