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A cherished part of his oeuvre, the 'Ariel Poems' of T. S. Eliot were originally commissioned for a pamphlet series of the same name that first ran between 1927 and 1931. ('Nobody else seemed to want the title afterward,' said Eliot of the series, 'so I kept it for myself.') That pamphlet series inventively paired an unpublished poem by a leading writer of the day with new artwork from an eminent artist. Thomas Hardy, Siegfried Sassoon, Barnett Freedman and John Nash were among the contributors to the first set, which broadly carried a Christmas theme and which sold for one shilling. The publisher's hope was that the pamphlets might double-up as greeting cards, and Eliot himself sent them as festive gifts to the writers on Faber's poetry list. This handsome new publication brings together, for the first time in a single edition, the six poems that T. S. Eliot wrote for the series, and in so doing restores them to the company of the artworks that originally partnered them.

This carefully crafted ebook: "The Bell Jar" is formatted for your eReader with a functional and detailed table of contents. Esther Greenwood, a young woman from the suburbs of Boston, gains a summer internship at a prominent magazine in New York City, under editor Jay Cee; however, Esther is neither stimulated nor excited by

either the big city or the glamorous culture and lifestyle that girls her age are expected to idolize and emulate. She instead finds her experience to be frightening and disorienting. From hereafter her mental state keeps deteriorating until she starts feeling helpless as if being kept inside a glass bell jar! The Bell Jar is the only novel written by the American writer and poet Sylvia Plath. Originally published under the pseudonym "Victoria Lucas" in 1963, the novel is semi-autobiographical, with the names of places and people changed. The book is often regarded as a roman à clef because the protagonist's descent into mental illness parallels Plath's own experiences with what may have been clinical depression or bipolar II disorder. Plath died by suicide a month after its first UK publication. The novel was published under Plath's name for the first time in 1967 and was not published in the United States until 1971, in accordance with the wishes of both Plath's husband, Ted Hughes, and her mother.

To my knowledge, she never scrapped any of her poetic efforts. With one or two exceptions, she brought every piece she worked on to some final form acceptable to her, rejecting at most the odd verse, or a false head or a false tail. Her attitude to her verse was artisan-like: if she couldn't get a table out of the material, she was quite happy to get a chair, or even a toy. The end product for her was not so much a successful poem, as something that had temporarily exhausted her ingenuity. So this book contains not merely what verse she saved, but—after 1956—all she wrote. First, it establishes a more accurate chronology for the composition dates of these poems, correcting many of the errors in dating in the order presented in *The Collected Poems of Sylvia Plath*. Further, based on this revised chronology, it traces Plath's development as a poet in these crucial years through a close examination of the poems. For many of these poems, the book gives new or alternative readings; for poems which may have been ignored previously, it offers first-time readings, thereby filling a gap in Plath studies. Finally, it contains reproductions of the paintings which serve as subjects of ten poems and reproductions of some of Plath's own sketches depicting scenes in a number of poems, as well as photographs of settings on which various poems are based.

"Ariel" by Sylvia Plath: A Study Guide is a book-length guide to Plath's most famous collection of poems which was edited by Ted Hughes and published in 1965 two years after her death. It aims to support the close reading of these sometimes complex and difficult poems. The book may be used by individuals reading and reflecting on this text alone, as well as by groups and classes reading, discussing and studying it. There is a detailed introduction to Sylvia Plath's poetry with

an emphasis on the problems of interpretation. For each poem (texts not included because they are still in copyright) there are: 1. Pre-reading questions; 2. Guiding questions; 3. Helpful textual notes; 4. A detailed commentary; 5. Perspectives - a collection of critical comments on the poem. Also includes: 6. Guidance on the use of the questions in class/study groups; 7. List of useful literary terms with definitions; 8. Bibliography. There are no answers to the guiding questions, but they are generally covered by the commentary.
