Psychological testing has grown exponentially as technological advances have permitted it to and societal complexities have necessitated its growth. Psychological testing or psychological assessment is a field characterised by the use of samples of behaviour in order to infer generalisations about a given individual. By samples of behaviour, one means observations over time of an individual performing tasks that have usually been prescribed beforehand. These responses are often compiled into statistical tables that allow the evaluator to compare the behaviour of the individual being tested to the responses of a norm group. The broad categories of psychological evaluation tests include: Norm-referenced, IQ/achievement tests, Neuropsychological tests, Personality tests, Objective tests (Rating scale), Direct observation tests, Psychological evaluations using data mining. New and important research is presented in this book.

This study investigated the validity of Rawley Silver's Draw a Story (DAS) assessment as a measure of depression. The DAS was administered to 70 volunteer participants (ages 19-65 years) who also completed the Beck Depression Inventory, second edition (BDI-II). A negative correlation between

the two measures would support the validity of the DAS as a measure of depression. A marginally significant negative correlation ($r=.20$, $p=.094$) was obtained. The correlation may have been attenuated by the small number of participants with high levels of self-reported depression. However, these results suggest that the DAS in its present form should not be used independently as a measure of depression. The DAS rating scale might benefit from modifications in order to become a more valid instrument for this purpose.

The Work Drawing Test (WDT) is a newly developed projective assessment that focuses on the individuals' dynamics and attitudes toward their work environment. At present, this test does not offer comparative research studies that will allow us to identify key differences between the normal population and those diagnosed with disorders of a psychological nature. This research will offer information to help recognize the differences between depressed and non-depressed individuals in their work environment. This instrument is intended to be utilized by trained professionals as a part of a comprehensive assessment battery for clinical and industrial settings. The participants were recruited from physicians' offices and psychologists' offices in accordance with ethical standards and guidelines. Participants were prescreened to ensure they met the inclusion requirements for either the study or control group. Participants were provided with a study package that included: a #2 pencil, plain white paper with instructions for completing the Work Drawing Test, demographic information form, Beck Depression Inventory-Second Edition (BDI-II), Brief Symptom Inventory (BSI), Job Description Index (JDI), and the Worker's Motivation Scale (WMS). A stepwise multiple linear regression analysis was used to predict the depressive criterion from the WDT scoring items. The results found 18 items that may be used to identify depression within the WDT. These 18 items were combined to create the Work Drawing Test-Depression Scale (WDT-D). These 18 items produced a Cronbach alpha of .780 for internal consistency. These items may aid the clinician in the identification of depression within a person's work environment in order to provide a more accurate diagnostic impression and treatment plan.
