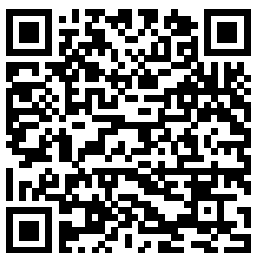

true vocation.  
Though Hölderlin is  
now established as  
a great lyric poet,  
recognition of his  
novel as a supreme  
achievement of

been belated in the  
Anglophone world.

feature of the age,  
Hyperion preaches  
a message of  
redemption through  
beauty. The  
resolution of the

antinomies raised in
