More is known about the pervasiveness of college cheating than reasons why students cheat and how the vice can be mitigated. This article presents findings of a study that attempted to explore academic dishonesty among undergraduate students at One University in Kenya. The study employed stratified random sampling technique to obtain 200 student respondents from the Main and the Town campuses of One University in Kenya. The strata were the various schools/faculties at the University. The study was conducted between the

months of June and July in 2017. Grounded on the Theory of Reasoned Action, the study focused on establishing the methods used by students in cheating in examinations, the reasons as to why the students cheat in examinations and suggesting ways in which this vice can be minimized. Data were collected by the use of a students' questionnaire. Partial least squares methodology was used to analyze the responses of students.

Lessons from 30 Years of Research Penguin

The purpose of this study was to examine how prevalent classroom cheating and plagiarizing has become and to inform educators on how to reduce these practices. Student cheating and plagiarism will be examined and analyzed to determine how severe the problem is, as well as finding potential reasons, methods, and solutions to the unethical practice. To see its impact on

a local college, fifty students enrolled at Indiana University-Bloomington were surveyed on potential classroom cheating and essay plagiarism. The grade level of the students ranged with 62% being freshmen, 30% as sophomores, juniors and Graduates each were represented by 2%, and seniors comprised 4% of the total student body. Results from the survey reveal that while 88% of the student sample saw classroom cheating as wrong, 40% admitted to doing it. 24% of the sample stated that they only cheated one to three times during their enrollment, 10% for four to six times, 4% cheated seven to nine times, while only 2% cheated more than ten times. Predetermined responses for why they defrauded their educators academically revealed that 85% of the admitted cheaters did so out of fear of failing with lesser numbers stating it was to save time and to handle the high stress of the class.

Despite high levels of test cheating, only 16% of the survey admitted to essay plagiarizing. The reasons why they copied and pasted without proper citation were the inverse of why they cheated with the most common response being to save time with the least being out of fear of failing. To summarize the reasoning behind wrongful student practices is that 52% of those surveyed stated that the grade was more important than the knowledge. The survey's results indicate that a large minority of college students are willing to earn acceptable grades without doing the appropriate work. The high level of admitted cheaters and plagiarists confirms that colleges are inadequately prepared to handle the raising levels of these practices. Educators need to understand the severity of this problem, learn the methods these students employ during test time and the means to counter them, use new anti-cheating

software to identify copied papers, and educate new students to understand exactly the consequences of not earning a degree legitimately. An In-depth Survey of Cheating & Plagiarizing in College is included.

"According to the Josephson Institute's 2006 Report Card on the Ethics of American Youth, today's young people

reveal deeply entrenched habits of dishonesty. The report, released as part of National CHARACTER COUNTS! Week (October 15-21) reveals high rates of cheating, lying and theft. Cheating in school continues to be rampant. A substantial majority (60%) cheated on a test during the past year (35% did so two or more times) and one in three (33%) said they used the Internet to plagiarize an assignment." As grim as these statistics appear to be, they are actually an improvement over earlier studies. According to Josephson Institute research, in the decade from 1992 to 2002 the number of high school students who admitted that they cheated on an exam increased

significantly from 61% to 74%. In 2000, 71% admitted to cheating. Three studies commissioned by Educational Testing Service articulate the motivations, reasons and beliefs of students who cheat on academic tasks. There are hundreds of specific practices that can be used to detect and punish cheating, including websites where teachers can upload student papers to check for pirated text. However, most educators agree that the best way to deal with cheating is to prevent it if at all possible. Some of these preventive practices include: (1) Give original and unique assignments that cannot be plagiarized or snagged off of a website; (2) Discuss

academic ethics early and often, and make clear what the penalties for cheating will be; (3) Reinforce quality performance by showcasing student work and conducting conferences with students about their assignments so that teachers can ascertain how familiar a student is with the concepts presented in the assignment; (4) Require that students show all work, including initial references, notes, drafts and subsequent revisions; and (5) Use essays that test students thinking and communication as well as their mastery of information.
