novel, Fight Club, was made into a cult film by David Fincher, Chuck Palahniuk has been a consistent presence on the New York Times best-seller list. Drawing on numerous

author interviews and written in an engaging and accessible style, *Understanding Chuck Palahniuk* should appeal to scholars, students, and fans alike.
