Their struggle to survive in the wilderness around them — as well as each other — make up the bulk of this classic tale of adventure. A film version of the book was made in 1965. From the book cover: To the desert came the plane, to the immeasurable wastes of Africa. And by the dawn of the second day — after the night storm, the hours of flight, the crash, the day of waiting, and the death of Detjens — six remained, alone, strangers, with only themselves and the wreckage and the black mountain on the horizon for company.
