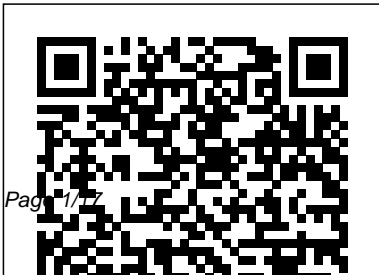

centers whiteness, Emdin argues, it dismisses ratchet identity (the embodying of “ negative ” characteristics associated with lowbrow culture, often thought to be possessed by people of a particular ethnic, racial, or socioeconomic status) as anti-intellectual and punishes young people for straying from these alleged “ academic norms, ” leaving young people in classrooms frustrated and uninspired. These deviations, Emdin explains, include so-called “ disruptive behavior ” and a celebration of hip-hop music and culture. Emdin argues that being “ ratchetdemic, ” or both ratchet and academic (like having rap battles about science, for example), can empower students to embrace themselves, their backgrounds, and their education as parts of a whole, not disparate identities. This means celebrating protest, disrupting the status quo, and reclaiming the genius of youth in the classroom.
