The publication history of and critical response to Wuthering Heights are intertwined with those of Charlotte's Jane Eyre and

Anne's Agnes Grey. Wuthering Heights and Agnes Grey were accepted for publication before Charlotte had finished writing Jane Eyre. However, their publisher delayed bringing their novels out, with the result that Jane Eyre was published first. Notes: *Wuthering Heights* was initially published under the ambiguous pseudonym of "Ellis Bell" so many early reviewers believed it to be written by a man. Some also

believed that Currer Bell (Charlotte) and Ellis Bell (Emily) were the same. The book was first published in December 1847. Reviews marked with \* were found in Emily's desk after her death.

*Wuthering Heights* has always inspired critics to examine the novel from a psychoanalytical perspective. Margaret Willy argues that Emily Brontë reveals in her text some psychological insights which are "strikingly modern" (64). Many

psychoanalytic critics have applied Freudian concepts to this novel, and numerous books and articles have been
