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child protective services (CPS) workers, who are at the forefront of every community's child protection efforts. The manual describes the basic stages of the CPS process and the steps necessary to accomplish each stage: intake, initial assessment or investigation, family assessment, case planning, service provision, evaluation of family progress, and case closure. Best practices and critical issues in casework practice are underscored throughout. The primary audience for this manual includes CPS caseworkers, supervisors, and administrators. The diagnostic process is a complex, collaborative activity that involves clinical reasoning and information gathering to determine a patient's health problem. According to *Improving Diagnosis in Health Care*, diagnostic errors-inaccurate or delayed diagnoses-persist throughout all settings of care and continue to harm an unacceptable number of patients. It is likely that most people will experience at least one diagnostic error in their lifetime,

In an effort to contain health care costs, Medicare initiated a prospective payment system based on diagnosis-related groups (DRGs) in 1983. In 1985, RAND began a study to determine the effect of DRG-based

prospective payment on quality of care for hospitalized Medicare patients. Six diseases (congestive heart failure, acute myocardial infarction, hip fracture, pneumonia, cerebrovascular accident, and depression) were selected for study in each of five states (California, Florida, Indiana, Pennsylvania, and Texas). This Note documents the medical record abstraction form and guidelines used to collect data from the medical records of patients hospitalized with pneumonia.
