war, were faced with the enormous problem
of what to do with the people being held
captive. As these camps were being
evacuated, the collapse of the front in
Poland and the advance of the Red Army
generated frantic waves of flight and the
evacuation of millions of civilians and
soldiers. The panicky retreat created
conditions under which prisoners were
murdered in horrific death marches. Gas
chambers in faraway camps were no longer in
use, and now the slaughters took place on
