In modern industrial democracies, the making of  
public policy is dependent on policy  
analysis--the generation, discussion, and  
evaluation of policy alternatives. Policy analysis is  
often characterized, especially by economists, as  
a technical, nonpartisan, objective enterprise,  
separate from the constraints of the political
