(1913), 'The Song of the Lark' (1915), 'My Ántonia' (1918) and *Death Comes for the Archbishop* (1927) which was an instant critical success. In 1923, Cather gained widespread international recognition when she was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for 'One of Ours', a novel set during World War I. Willa Cather was granted honorary degrees by Princeton, Berkeley and Yale and in 1931 she graced the cover of *Time* Magazine. The American Academy of Arts and Letters awarded her a gold medal for fiction in 1944.
