Those delegated powers of the National Government that are spelled out, expressed, in the Constitution; also called the "enumerated powers". Implied Powers. Those delegated powers of the National Government that are suggested by the expressed powers; those "necessary and proper" to carry out the expressed powers.

Implied powers. powers not specifically mentioned in the constitution. Inherent powers. The powers of the national government in foreign affairs that the Supreme Court has declared do not depend on constitutional grants but rather grow out of the very existence of
