Social Work Practice is organized around the decisions social workers make in their daily work with clients. These include decisions about the nature of the problems clients confront, what information to gather, how to combine different sources of information, what criteria to rely on to select intervention methods, and how to evaluate practice. The text emphasizes the importance of thinking critically about practice decisions and building a deeper understanding of the problems which affect clients in order to provide them with better services. While many texts rely on simple presentation of popular, traditional methods, Social Work Practice presents a solid conceptual foundation for practice which draws on a wider range of social science knowledge and empirical data. Successfully integrating theory and practice, the book offers

students clear and accessible guidelines for integrating this knowledge in everyday practice decisions. Social Work Practice offers a basic practice framework which can be used at all levels of intervention (individual, family, community, or political and economic) and with all types of clients. Step-by-step guidelines and useful examples are included for each phase of practice, including assessment, intervention, and evaluation. These guidelines are examined critically to address the underlying assumptions and controversies surrounding them. The text will emphasize key contemporary issues such as respecting individual differences, cross-cultural communication, recognizing how broader social issues contribute to client problems, empowering clients by offering them real influence over the quality of their lives, using validated methods, and evaluating service outcomes. Social Work Practice also addresses often ignored topics including the potential for harming as well as helping in the profession, hidden forms of coercion cloaked in professional jargon, and the importance of

critically examining background knowledge concerning the problems social workers address. This book will not only help students to develop practice skills, but to acquire decision making skills that maximize their likelihood of offering high quality services to clients.
