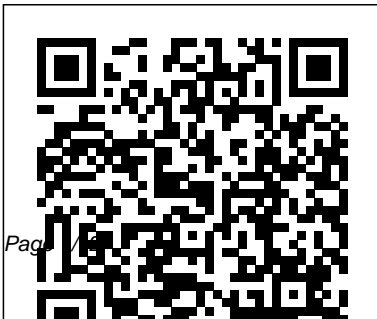

Hidden Faces Salvador Dali

As far back as 1922 the great poet Garcia Lorca had predicted that I was destined for a literary career and had suggested that my future lie precisely in the "pure novel." In Salvador Dalí's only novel, the reader enters the bizarre world already familiar to us from his paintings. Dalí describes, in vividly visual terms, the intrigues and love affairs of a group of dazzling, eccentric aristocrats who, with their luxurious and extravagant lifestyle, symbolize the decadence of the 1930s. The story of the tangled lives of the protagonists, from the

February riots of 1934 in Paris to the closing days of World War II, constitutes a brilliant and dramatic vehicle for Dalí's vision and reads as an epitaph of pre-war Europe.

Using 50 color images and more than 160 black-and-white illustrations, Danchev delves deeply into Magritte's artistic development and the profound questions he raised in his work about the very nature of authenticity. This is a vital biography for our time that plumbs the mystery of an iconoclast whose influence can be seen in everyone from Jasper Johns to Beyoncé.

Among the many books written on or by Salvador Dal í , this is the first to give a complete, well-documented picture of his life and art. Carlos Rojas's approach to Dal í is somewhere between biography, Freudian analysis, and art and literary interpretation. Dal í is haunted from earliest childhood by the specter of his elder brother who died as a toddler shortly before Dal í was conceived (both brothers and the father bore the same name), as he is haunted by the devouring phantom of his mother, that praying mantis

on whose portrait he would like to spit. Dal í is seen as endlessly struggling to affirm his identity and existence. A combination of genius, madman, neurotic, and spoiled brat, Dal í is illuminated by his work, while the known facts of his life, his own writings, those of his sister, and of others, are used to analyze the paintings, which are described in considerable detail. Rojas also provides sustained analyses of Dal í 's relationships, including his influential amorous and intellectual affair with Federico Garc í a Lorca.

Surrealism and Women ABRAMS

These sixteen illustrated essays present an important revision of surrealism by focusing on the works of women surrealists and their strategies to assert

positions as creative subjects within a movement that regarded woman primarily as an object of masculine desire or fear. While the male surrealists attacked aspects of the bourgeois order, they reinforced the traditional patriarchal image of woman. Their emphasis on dreams, automatic writing, and the unconscious reveal some of the least inhibited masculine fantasies. The first resistance to the male surrealists' projection of the female figure arose in the writings and paintings of marginalized woman artists and writers associated with Surrealism. The essays in this collection explore the complexity of these women's works, which simultaneously employ and subvert the dominant discourse of male surrealists.
