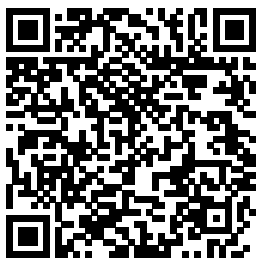

Willem Samuels is a long-time resident of Jakarta and has translated several of Pramoedya's works including *The Fugitive*, *The Mute's Soliloquy*, *The Girl From the Coast* and *All That is Gone*.
