Congress and addressing audiences around the world about how to make schools better places for children—John Holt founded *Growing Without Schooling* magazine in 1977 to support self-directed education and learning outside of school. Each issue is a lively exchange among readers and Holt, packed with useful advice, resource recommendations, and all sorts of legal, pedagogical, and parenting ideas from people who pioneered what we now call homeschooling. John Holt (1983-1985) is the author of *How Children Learn* and *How Children Fail*, which together have sold over a million and a half copies, and eight other books about children and learning. His work has been translated into more than 40 languages. Once a leading figure in school reform, John Holt became increasingly interested in how children learn outside of school. The magazine he founded, *Growing Without Schooling* (GWS), reflects his philosophy, which he called unschooling. GWS was published from 1977 to 2001 and is the first magazine devoted to

homeschooling and self-directed education. *How Children Fail* Penguin  
In the book, "How Children Fail", John Holt simply but honestly records classroom interactions in a refreshing, realistic and humorous style of delivery. Many of Holt's real stories have to do with teachers often falling into the trap of asking students questions and looking only for "right answers." Holt's main thrust is child failure in a success oriented culture. He is alarmed at the increasing role of failure in American schools. He warns against teachers using subject-matter in an end itself. Holt believes that teachers teach subjects rather than teach students. By teaching only subjects, abstraction, curiosity, appreciation, discovery interaction, exploration, and intrinsic motivation are suppressed. Ironically these qualities are professed to be objectives of American education. Even students who consistently make higher grades often times fail to develop creativity and understanding. Holt is also concerned with

schools where children are made go go and often fail because of high adult expectations. He is also concerned with scared learners. The author of this article maintains that schools have improved since the writing of this book. Schools are a kinder and more humane place to be. Teachers are now learning to connect with children's backgrounds and prior experiences, implementing more diverse and appropriate lessons. Teachers listen to children more and demonstrate mutual respect. Today there are less scared learners who embrace each day at school with enthusiasm without fear.

Boredom results from limited or narrow demands on intelligence, capabilities, and talents. Four ways to overcome failure are discussed: strategy; fear and failure; real learning; and how schools fail. Strategy explores ways children meet or dodge adult demands. Fear and failure looks at the effects of their strategy on learning. Real learning discusses what children appear to know, expect to know, and know.
