In the book, "How Children Fail", John Holt simply but honestly records classroom interactions in a refreshing, realistic and humorous style of falling into the trap of asking students questions and looking only for "right answers." Holt's main thrust is child failure in a success oriented culture. He is alarmed at the increasing role of failure in American schools. Holt believes that teachers teach subjects rather than teach students. The author of this article maintains that schools have improved since the writing of this book. Schools are a kinder and more humane place to be. Teachers are now learning to connect with children's backgrounds and prior experiences, implementing more diverse and appropriate lessons.
