In Huid en Haar wordt de markt van de liefde gereguleerd door straf, ook waar geen schuld lijkt te zijn. Roland Oberstein, universitair docent economie in Fairfax, is vader en gelukkig gescheiden. Zijn vriendin Violet woont in Amsterdam en is ontwerpster van damestassen. Ze wordt tot wanhoop gedreven als Oberstein onaangedaan lijkt te zijn door haar overspel. Tijdens een conferentie over de Holocaust ontmoet Oberstein de Amerikaanse Lea, biografe van kampcommandant Höss. Gedeelde belangstelling voor volkerenmoord blijkt de basis van een intensieve vriendschap. Grunberg schreef een verhaal over verboden liefde, pervers plezier, overspel en machtsmisbruik, met de Amerikaanse en Nederlandse academische wereld en de stedelijke politiek van New York als decor.

It is the Monaco Grand Prix in May 1968. Jack Preston, a mechanic for Team Sutton, is making the final checks on his car as the beau monde mingles with the drivers under the eyes of the world's press and the galleries of spectators. DeeDee, a starlet of great beauty, seems to be walking towards him, or perhaps towards the royal box. Without warning a fireball rips across the starting grid. The journey will bring Janny and Lien close to Anne and her older sister Margot. The days ahead will test the sisters beyond human imagination as they are stripped of everything but their courage, their resilience, and their love for each other. Based on meticulous research and unprecedented access to the Brilleslijpers' personal archives of memoirs and photos, *Sisters of Auschwitz* is a long-overdue homage to two young women's heroism and moral bravery—and a reminder of the power each of us has to change the world.

Now back in print for the first time since 1969, a stunning novel about childhood, marriage, and divorce by one of the most interesting minds of the twentieth century. Dream and reality overlap in *Divorcing*, a book in which divorce is not just a question of a broken marriage but names a rift that runs right through the inner and outer worlds of Sophie Blind, its brilliant but desperate protagonist. Can the rift be mended? Perhaps in the form of a novel, one that goes back from present-day New York to Sophie's childhood in pre-World War II Budapest, that revisits the divorce between her Freudian father and her fickle mother, and finds a place for a host of further tensions and contradictions in her present life. The question that haunts *Divorcing*, however, is whether any novel can be fleet and bitter and true and light enough to gather up all the darkness of a given life. Susan Taubes's startlingly original novel was published in 1969 but largely ignored at the time; after the author's tragic early death, it was forgotten. Its republication presents a chance to discover a splintered, glancing, caustic, and lyrical work by a dazzlingly intense and inventive writer.
