scientists know her as HeLa. She

was a poor Southern tobacco farmer

who worked the same land as her

slave ancestors, yet her cells—taken

investigating HeLa began using her

husband and children in research

without informed consent. And

though the cells had launched a

multimillion-dollar industry that sells

human biological materials, her

family never saw any of the profits.
