Born in winter while the sea stormed, Thomas is the youngest child, and the only son surviving. In Dunwich, life is quiet and shaped by the seasons: fishing and farming, the

Thomas visits his brothers' grave in the churchyard, sketches the boats from the harbor, and longs for adventure -- a chance to go to sea. Yet just as Thomas and Mac's friendship begins to bloom, war with Germany is declared. The summer guests flee, replaced by regiments of soldiers on their way to Belgium. And as the war weighs increasingly heavily on the community, the villagers on the home front become increasingly suspicious of Mac and his curious behavior. Mr. Mac and Me is the story of an unlikely friendship, and a vivid portrait of one of the most brilliant and misunderstood artists of his generation.

*Lark Rise to Candleford* is a trilogy of semi-autobiographical novels about the countryside of north-east Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire, England, at the end of the 19th century. They were written by Flora Thompson and first published together in 1945. The stories were previously published separately as *Lark Rise* in 1939, *Over to Candleford* in 1941 and *Candleford Green* in 1943. The stories relate to three communities: the hamlet of Juniper Hill ("*Lark Rise*"), where Flora grew up; Buckingham ("*Candleford*"), one of the nearest towns (which include both Brackley and Bicester) and the nearby village of Fringford ("*Candleford Green*"), where Flora got her first job in the Post Office.
