The novel deals with three main themes: family, work and true love. They are all interdependent. Each theme is a necessary condition to realize the identity of the heroine. According to Sarah Elbert, Alcott created a new literary form that absorbed elements of romantic children's novels and combined them with other novels to form emotional novels .
