Hugo's most famous novels are "The Hunchback of Notre-Dame" about a young, misshapen boy living a solitary life in the Parisian cathedral, and "Les Miserable" which describes the hardships of Paris' poorest. These two novels, and many others of Hugo's works, have been adapted into movies, musicals and plays.
