The Skull, Chest, and Abdomen. In a general way, we may compare the human body to three closed boxes, one above another. These boxes are the skull, the chest, and the abdomen. The arteries are deep down among the muscles, but some of the veins are close to the surface. We can see blue veins at the temples and on the backs of our hands.
