A produção literária de José de Sousa Saramago, autor português, configura-se em âmbito internacional, no exercício das diferentes estéticas do gênero romanesco, entre eles, o Novo Romance Histórico, que possui em sua obra Memorial do Convento, publicada em 1982, um dos mais significativos exemplares do gênero composto pelo escritor. O objetivo desta dissertação é apreender os elementos relativos à tradição e à transgressão na personagem ficcional Blimunda, no romance Memorial do Convento, 1982, de José Saramago, de maneira a verificar como é que o potencial de criação presente em sua estruturação se manifesta, conduzindo-nos a uma reflexão sobre a realidade e a ficção, verificando como esta personagem, enquanto elemento narrativo, atinge relevante importância no enredo, exatamente pelo seu traço criativo, reflexivo e crítico. Nossa investigação procurou observar esses elementos e em que medida esta personagem constitui-se em uma heroína que, ao mesmo tempo em que obedece aos códigos sociais e morais determinados pela classe dominante do século XVIII, em especial, neste romance, o lusitano - Estado e Igreja - transgride-os, definindo sua existência enquanto ser, não apenas um indivíduo, mas representante de um grupo de indivíduos que luta por transformações sociais significativas em busca de sua plenitude, a fim de dar um real sentido para sua existência humana, tornando a sociedade mais justa e mais humana. Sob essa perspectiva, nosso ponto de partida é o exame, baseado na teoria desenvolvida por Lucien Goldmann, das personagens femininas D. Maria Ana Josefa, a rainha, e Inês Antónia em confronto de suas ações, pensamentos, desejos, ansiedades e frustrações, em seus percursos, com as ações desenvolvidas durante a narrativa por Blimunda.
