In this collection of provocative articles and blog posts originally published between 2010 and 2014, Alfie Kohn challenges the conventional wisdom about topics ranging from how low-income children are taught, to whether American schools have really fallen behind those in other countries. Why, he asks, do we assume learning can be reduced to numerical data? What leads us to believe that "standards-based" grading will eliminate the inherent limitations of marks? Or that training students to show more "grit" makes sense if the real trouble is with the tasks they've been given to do? What is most remarkable about the assortment of discipline programs on the market today is the number of fundamental assumptions they seem to share. Some may

advocate the use of carrots rather than sticks; some may refer to punishments as "logical consequences."
