of the city, but rather an
entertaining account about

and place. Please be aware
that this is a 298 page,
heavily illustrated book in the
same fixed format as the
printed book. As such, it is a
download of about large

227 MB and will take much
longer to download than a
novel in flowing format that
has no illustrations.

Far from the coastal centers of culture and politics, Kansas stands at the very center of American stereotypes about red states. In the American imagination, it is a place LGBT people leave. The book also looks forward, as an inspiring guide for progressives concerned about the future of any vilified minority in an increasingly polarized nation.
