At the beginning, Quatermain has lost his only son and longs to get back into the wilderness. Having persuaded Sir

Henry Curtis, Captain John Good, and the Zulu chief Umslopogaas to accompany him, they set out from the coast of east Africa into the territory of the Maasai. While staying with a Scottish missionary, Mr. Mackenzie, they are attacked by a Maasai group, whom they overcome heroically. They travel by canoe along an underground river to a lake (which turns out to be the sacred lake of Zu-Vendis) in the kingdom of Zu-Vendis beyond a range of mountains. The Zu-Vendi are a warlike white race isolated from other African races; their capital is called Milosis. At the time of the British party's arrival, they are ruled jointly by two sisters, Nyleptha and Sorais. The priests of the Zu-Vendi religion are hostile to the explorers as it is apparent they offended against the religion, but the queens protect them.

The past is what happened. History is what we remember and write about that past, the narratives we craft to make sense out of our memories and their sources. But what does it mean to look at the past and to remember that "nothing happened"? Why might we feel as if "nothing is the way it was"? This book transforms these utterly ordinary observations and redefines "Nothing" as something we have known and can remember. "Nothing" has been a catch-all term for everything that is supposedly uninteresting or is just not there. It will take some—possibly considerable—mental adjustment before we can see Nothing as Susan A. Crane does here, with a capital "n." But Nothing has actually been happening all along. As Crane shows in her witty and provocative discussion, Nothing

is nothing less than fascinating. When Nothing has changed but we think that it should have, we might call that injustice; when Nothing has happened over a long, slow period of time, we might call that boring. Justice and boredom have histories. So too does being relieved or disappointed when Nothing happens—for instance, when a forecasted end of the world does not occur, and millennial movements have to regroup. By paying attention to how we understand Nothing to be happening in the present, what it means to "know Nothing" or to "do Nothing," we can begin to ask how those experiences will be remembered. Susan A. Crane moves effortlessly between different modes of seeing Nothing, drawing on visual analysis and cultural studies to suggest a new way of thinking about history. By remembering how Nothing happened, or how Nothing is the way it was, or how Nothing has changed, we can recover histories that were there all along.

of Harriet Beecher Stowe, including her childhood, early married life, time in poverty, travels and successful writing career. Born in June of 1811, Harriet Beecher Stowe was the seventh of 13 children born to famous Protestant preacher Lyman Beecher. In her early adulthood, Harriet worked alongside her older sister, Catharine, as a teacher. Her earliest published work was a children's geography book penned with her sister's name in 1833. In 1836, she married Calvin Stowe and wrote many articles for religious periodicals while raising her seven children. During this time, she also wrote several volumes of poetry, travel books and children's stories. Stowe also wrote at least ten novels, of which the most famous is *Uncle Tom's Cabin*, published in 1852. An extremely controversial work, Stowe became famous after its release. The following year, she would write *A Key to Uncle Tom's Cabin* in response to critics who refuted the authenticity of the book's stories. She would publish another anti-slavery novel, *Dred*, in 1856. Just after the start of the American Civil War, Stowe met with President

Abraham Lincoln. During this meeting, he famously addressed her as "the little lady who made this big war."
