Woven into an exploration of the vastness of geological time, for instance, is the peculiar history of the giant tortoises and the sea turtles—whose journeys between water and land tell us a deeper story about evolution. At this moment, when so many highly placed people still question the fact of evolution, Dawkins asks what Darwin would make of his own legacy—"a mixture of exhilaration and exasperation"—and celebrates science as possessing many of religion's virtues—"explanation, consolation, and uplift"—without its detriments of superstition and prejudice.
