Uniform use in public schools is rising, but we know little about how they affect students. Using a unique dataset from a large urban school district in the southwest United States, we assess how uniforms affect behavior, achievement and other outcomes.

Each school in the district determines adoption independently, providing variation over schools and time. By including student and school fixed-effects we find evidence that uniform adoption improves attendance in secondary grades, while in elementary schools they generate large increases in teacher retention.

In response to the growing levels of violence and the decreasing levels of academic performance, many schools have decided to implement policies on school uniforms. This report provides a brief history of school uniforms, the positive outcomes of implementing such a policy, and information regarding the many schools across the country who have established a policy on school uniforms. Research indicates that school uniforms may improve the school environment. Numerous schools have experienced a decrease in violence, competitive behaviors, theft, and gang related incidents after requiring students to wear school uniforms. Schools who have created a uniform policy have noted improvements in academic achievement, attendance, and a more positive school climate. Collier High School, an alternative high school for students primarily experiencing emotional and behavioral disabilities, could benefit from a policy on school uniforms. Students at Collier often violate the dress code leading to behavior reports or suspensions. Oftentimes, inappropriate attire creates conflicts among the students and frequently distracts students from focusing on their academics. The staff members and students of Collier High School participated in a survey regarding their perceptions about a policy on school uniforms. In addition, students were invited to share their thoughts on a uniform policy in focus groups. The Fashion Class at Collier was given the opportunity to design school uniforms as well as incorporate a segment into the annual fashion show in which students could model uniforms for the staff, students, and parents to see.

Does clothing make the person or does the person make the clothing? How does what attire a student wears to school affect their academic achievement? In 1996, President Clinton cited examples of school violence and discipline issues that might have been avoided had the students been wearing uniforms ("School uniforms: Prevention or suppression?"). In his 1998 State of the Union address, he mentioned the positive impact uniforms had made in the Long Beach Unified School District, which has a highly diverse ethnic and socioeconomic population that is also the third largest district in California. When students have continuous negative experiences in school, dropping out and delinquency tend to be the common responses. The role of schools is to provide a positive, safe and secure learning environment where students feel protected enough to explore and develop their intellectual and social competencies. Hard evidence that proves the wearing of uniforms provides a direct link to better academic achievement is not conclusive, however, there is evidence that supports there are fewer discipline problems/referrals and violence as well as higher attendance rates since the implementation of a uniform policy. What appears to have been overlooked in the data analysis is the effect of other programs that are often being implemented at the same time as the uniform policy and may also have a direct impact on the discipline and attendance issues.
