Imitating Christ in Magwi: An Anthropological Theology achieves two things. Unlike theology that draws only upon abstract concepts, what Whitmore calls “ anthropological theology ” is consonant with the fact that God did indeed become human. It may well involve risk to one's own life — Whitmore had to leave Uganda for three years after writing an article critical of the President — but that is what imitatio Christi sometimes requires.
