Thanks to him you’ll know how to get the very best service from any business that makes its money from putting heads in beds. Or, at the very least, you will keep the bellmen from taking your luggage into the camera-free back office and bashing it against the wall repeatedly.

Keasler died in Plant City in 1996, and was remembered by the Miami Herald as having left "a legacy of love for his home state."
