The second section is focused on research reports from studies of student learning in social studies with technology. The third section contains research reports on teachers ' pedagogical considerations for using technology in social studies. In the fourth and final section, we present work that broadly reviews and critiques

research in focused areas of social studies and technology. This volume contains twelve chapters, each of which focuses on social studies content and pedagogy and how the field is affected and enhanced with technology. The volume includes research and theoretical works on various topics, including digital history, digital video, geography, technology use in the K-12 social studies classroom, and artificial intelligence.
