Homogeneous Second Order Differential Equations

Consider the homogeneous linear second order ODE $ay'' + by' + cy = 0$:
(1) Suppose that the characteristic equation $ar^2 + br + c = 0$ (2) has two distinct real roots. According to the quadratic formula, these are given by $r = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$ where $b^2 - 4ac > 0$ is the discriminant of (2).

Repeated Roots - In this section we discuss the solution to homogeneous, linear, second order differential equations, $ay'' + by' + cy = 0$, in which the roots of the characteristic polynomial, $ar^2 + br + c = 0$, are repeated, i.e. double, roots.

How to find a solution of a second order differential ...
Second-Order Differential Equation: The defined differential equation is a second-order homogeneous differential equation of the form $\{eq\}by'' + cy' + d = 0 \{/eq\}$.

Second Order Linear Homogeneous Differential Equations ...

Because power series expansions of functions are unique, this equation can be true only if the coefficients of each power of x are zero.

Second Order Differential Equation Non Homogeneous

Solution Of Second Order Differential

In this chapter we will be looking exclusively at linear second order differential equations. The most general linear second order differential equation is in the form. $p(t)y'' + q(t)y' + r(t)y = g(t)$

As expected for a second-order differential equation, this solution depends on two arbitrary constants. However, note that our differential equation is a constant-coefficient differential equation, yet the power series solution does not appear to have the familiar form (containing exponential functions) that we are used to seeing.
