Since that time, an entire generation has come to believe that personal choice is the most important of life's values. But Ehrenhalt argues that if we truly wish to balance the demands of modern life with a feeling of community, we have a great deal to learn from the "limited" life of the 1950s. *The Lost City* reveals the price we must pay to restore community in our lives today and the values that will make such a restoration possible.
