An introverted young boy on the verge of manhood gets a lesson on just how far is too far when he falls for a needy woman who lives life in the fast lane. If movies like *Oceans 11* are about the sexy allure of the criminal worlds, then *Stray Bullets* is about the desperation and rage of characters whose lives are ultimately defined by a series of bad choices.
