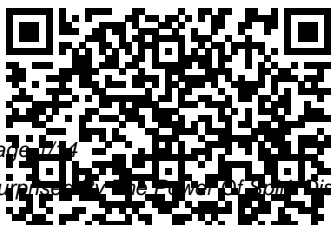

response, Tartakovsky
theorizes a new category of
rhyme that he terms
“sporadic.” Since it is not
systematized or expected,
sporadic rhyme can be a
single, strongly resounding
rhyme used suddenly in a
free verse poem. It can also
be an internal rhyme in a
villanelle or a few scattered
rhymes unevenly
distributed throughout a
longer poem that
nevertheless create a
meaningful cluster of
words. Examining usages
across varied poetic
traditions, Tartakovsky
locates sporadic rhyme in
sources ranging from a
sixteenth-century sonnet to
a nonsensical, practically
unperformable piece by
Gertrude Stein and a 2007
MoveOn.org ad in the New
York Times. With careful
attention to the

soundscapes of poems, *Surprised by Sound* demonstrates that rhyme's enduring value lies in its paradoxical and unstable nature as well as its capacity for creating poetic, cognitive, and psychic effects.
