Cabbies and waiters bought up condos with no money down in places like Las Vegas. Prices rose 25 percent or more every year in some coastal markets. Even people with terrible credit financed houses at five or seven times their annual income. All of it was made possible by the Fed and its mania for low interest rates. So when the experts said “ Nobody could have seen this coming, ” the Mises Institute had Mark ’ s articles and papers ready to go. The housing crash, and the meltdown in equity markets less than a year later, were thoroughly explained by Austrian business cycle theory. And Mark was the capable face of the Mises Institute during it all. Without a lay-friendly book like *The Skyscraper Curse*, millions more Americans will be duped by the next crash. Dr. Thornton ’ s book tells the story that needs to be told. It will be among the only alternative explanations available when the next crisis comes.
