The recurring language motif of *Weight* is “ I want to tell the story again. ” My work is full of Cover Versions. I like to take stories we think we know and record them differently. In the retelling comes a new emphasis or bias, and the new arrangement of the key elements demands that fresh material be injected into the existing text. *Weight* moves far away from the simple story of Atlas ’ s punishment and his temporary relief when Hercules takes the world off his shoulders.
