The volume explores how new millennium globalization mediates language learning and identity construction. Analyzing these writings in the context of the black Atlantic struggle for freedom, *The Trickster Comes West* relocates the beginnings of Pan-Africanism and suggests the strong influence of its theories of communal resistance, racial solidarity, and economic development on pioneering black narratives.
